Monogram's 1/48th B-25J A Vintage Kit From 1981 by Milton Bell, IPMS #16702

Tremember the first "Up to Date and Accurate" B-25 from Monogram. It was the B-25H with the snout of a 75 mm gun showing through a gun port below the pilot. I was impressed!

I didn't buy the kit, but Greg Springer built it and it looked good. By the time I got around to getting one, it was out of production. A little later Monogram brought out the Glass Nose B-25J with a big "Pancho" decal on the nose. That one I bought but never built. From time to time I would take it down and look it over. I had built Monogram's B-26 and enjoyed the build but hated the raised detail that I removed trying to get the fuselage seam to disappear. I expected the same from the B-25 so I hesitated. At the time I had not tried rescribing so the kit languished in my closet until a friend offered me some really neat markings from a new company. All I had to do to try them was build a 1/48th B-25J!

I agreed to try the decals and write a quick review of them so out came the old kit. By this (continued on page 4) ASMS is on the Internet

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Mike's Montage...



time there was a bit of warping evident on part of the fuselage and the wings. No matter, I was convinced that I could resolve the warpage problem and rescribe the fuselage and wing tops.



Rescribing was not difficult, but I went through several lengths of Dymo labeling tape. The best scribing tool I had was from Bare Metal Foil and I had to resharpen it several times. The tape was my straight-edge, and the model kit was molded in silver styrene and that helped. If you didn't know, kits molded in silver retain an image of detail even if it gets sanded off.

Since the B-25 had a high wing, most of the maintenance and inspection hatches were on the bottom, leaving the wing top relatively smooth except for areas around the nacelles and the fueling ports. So, I decided to rescribe the top and forget the bottom—it's not readily seen anyway and has a lot of intricate detail that I did not want to lose.

The fuselage was rescribed as far as possible before the halves were glued together. Same was true for the wings. When the fuselage was assembled and the seam sanded and filled, I scribed the missing panel lines. The horizontal stabilizer's detail was pretty straightforward and it was all rescribed. No sweat.

Since the cockpit is pretty much buttoned up and little can be seen, very little effort was made for super detailing. Belts were added from lead foil with no buckles added. Sidewall detail was painted but not added to



with PE or resin. The only detail addition was a drop of CA added to each instrument face. The cockpit interior was painted Dull Dark Green. The real thing was possibly Bronze Green but a viewer of the model can't really tell. The remainder of the fuselage interior was painted Yellow Zing Chromate. Seat cushions were painted dark tan. Everything inside was given a good coat of Future and then washed with burnt umber. A wipedown left just enough of the dirty brown oil paint to define the details and structure.

The wings were assembled, and I discovered one of the main faults of the kit; the nacelle to wing bottom fit is really bad. Take a look at the photo. That's a gap of almost a $1/16^{\text{th}}$ of an inch



around the nacelle. My best bet was to align the nacelle top to bottom and then tack glue it to the wing bottom. The gap was filled with Milliput (Standard) which I rolled into several small

"snakes." These were pressed into the gap with a small flat piece of wood. When the gap was filled, I smoothed the joint down with a wet finger tip. Next day, the filler was dry and hard as rock! I spent quite a while sanding it all down. Needless to say, I lost a lot of detail around the nacelles.

One of the challenges of doing twin engine bombers of the period that sit on tricycle gear is keeping the nose down. Kits usually suggest building in props that conveniently fit as accessories to hold the tail up. I really prefer not to carry a bunch of props around and have to assemble them in order to display the model.

Fortunately, there is room to hide weight even with the clear nose. The area opposite the nose gear well can be packed with lead shot, sinkers, or whatever. Also the bombardier's crawl space can be packed with weight. I even formed a "pack" from lead putty and placed it in the front office after painting it OD. Weight needs to be added as far forward as possible. If you need more, you can wrap lead wire or solder just behind the engines. I recommend leaving the cowlings off until the very last just in case.

The wings are guided onto the fuselage by a couple of spar-like extentsion from two formers. This simplifies getting the dihedral reasonably correct. I found that using rubber bands around the nacelles and across the fuselage held the wings in place until the glue had set. I also found that a small amount of filler was needed around each joint but very little detail was affected.



I hate to add landing gear struts at an early stage of building. Unfortunately, the B-25's nose gear has to be added before the fuselage halves are glued together. Luckily, I broke mine only once. A brass pin strengthened the strut and gave me a little more confidence. The main gear struts were left off until the very end. They can be added easily with no modification but you should always check the model to be sure.

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The same thing applies to guns. I found that I could add the tail guns after most painting was done and the waist guns were attached to the clear parts with white glue and then the clear parts were attached. The nose gun was done in a similar manner but here I had to prefit the clear nose cap. When I was sure it would fit, I fixed the gun in place with white glue and then added the clear cap.



Most of the warpage I encountered was in the nose but since it was probably unique to my very old kit, I'll not go into dealing with it. If you need to know, just ask.

Now a word (or two) about colors. Bombshell includes photos of the subject which I find to be a great help. All this series of B-25J's were based on Corsica. The one I modelled was named "Stuff" and was from the 445th Bomb Squadron. If you have read Joseph Heller's *Catch 22* or seen the movie, this is one of the groups he wrote about.

Most, if not all, of the B-25Js assigned to Corsica were supplied in natural metal finish (NMF). They remained so until a surprise visit from the *Luftwaffe*, and several planes were damaged or destroyed. From then on, they were given a coat of camouflage color on the top side. This color depended on the availability of paint. Some were painted in British Dark Green, and some were done in USAAF Olive Drab. Stuff's photo sure looks like OD, so that's what I used.





These aircraft were used hard, so I chose to dirty mine up some. Extra black was sprayed around the engines, top and bottom to suggest oil and exhaust that was blown back by the prop wash and tracked around by maintenance personnel.

Bombshell's decals came off the backing sheet quickly and cleanly and responded well to MicroSol red label decal solution. The colors are opaque and bright. Since the markings looked almost too new, I chose to dull them down by painting over them

with my Burnt Umber wash and then rubbing off most of the stain.

If you choose to do a B-25J, be aware that the top turret did not have painted bands over or across it. Other than metal shields in the slits that allowed the guns to elevate, all the parts were clear. What appear to be bands are overlapping parts of the clear sections of the turret cover.

That's about all I can say for this older kit. I notice that it has been reissued in a Revell Box. It's not bad for its age, and if you want to do a B-25J, you don't have much choice. Those Accurate Miniatures B-25 kits are all earlier versions.

If you want a late B-25, just buy it and build it and enjoy it. Have fun! $\frac{1}{24}$






14 Years Ago (January 1994) ...

GSI Creos Mr. Line Chisel (GT65)



The stock number for the replacement bit is GT65A, and a 0.2mm (GT65B) chisel bit is also available. Both are priced at ¥800 (about USD \$8.81) each.

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Old Rumors & New Kits

It's great to start off a brand new year of news and rumors about modeling. Scale modeling that is. I once filled out a form and said I was interested in model photography and got several queries from young ladies who aspired to be models. And no, I didn't.

On a personal note, I recently had cataract surgery. I had the first eye done in December and my left eye just last week. I have to say if any of you need it or have a friend or family member who is afraid of the procedure, it's a snap and the results are great! The procedure is painless, takes only about fifteen minutes and then you get to go home. You can take the eye patch off the next day and you can see so much better. Will my model building improve? Probably not but I'll be seeing my mistakes clearer!

Presently I'm working on the Cessna Bobcat from Czech Models and it's coming along pretty well. There are a lot of good so-called "limited run" models that aren't main stream and so don't always have all the detail or engineering the top shelf kits have. It takes a bit more experience but after doing a few ordinary kits most modelers should be up to the task. I recommend trying one or two.

The most impressive list of new kits comes from Revell of Germany. This time the good aircraft kits are $1/32^{nd}$ scale since that seems to be the new $1/48^{th}$. RoG lists three that really stand out. First is an Arado Ar.196A followed by a BaE Hawk T-1 Red Arrows. Then there is the first injected $1/32^{nd}$ He.111P. That's right. I suppose that since the Ju.88 was met with considerable enthusiasm and success, they decided that an He. 111—which is only slightly larger—would be a good idea. Certainly sounds good to me! Just don't get in a hurry for any of these. All three are slated for a fourth quarter release. Maybe Santa will bring you one!

If you want a nice $1/32^{nd}$ helo, you can get the EC-145 MedStar Eurocopter in April. This should be an ideal subject for $1/32^{nd}$ scale. Plenty of doodads and fiddly bits to work with.

For us fans of 1/48th, RoG is bringing back some of the former Monogram goodies from days gone by. The Do.335 is back on the shelves as is the A-10 Thunderbolt II, one of the best Warthog kits produced IMHO.

Revell-Monogram will bring back the Monogram B-26 Marauder, the He.111H-22 with buzz-bomb, the F4C Phantom, all 1/48th, and the 1/72nd F-82 Twin Mustang. They also list a MiG 25 Foxbat which is likely the old Revell kit. Look for them the first and second quarters.

It appears that R-M has dusted off a bunch of older tools so don't be surprised to see some interesting re-pops of oldie kits, such as the Creature From the Black Lagoon, the Black Knight of Nurnberg, Corporal Missile with Transporter, USS Chicago, '67 Dodge Charger, and the list goes on. Just keep watching those LHS shelves and this space.

I just picked up one of the two new $1/72^{nd}$ Airfix Canberra kits, the B(I)8 and discovered it to be a really nice kit. No idea how it fits but it's from a new tool and has markings for three versions. I'll be doing a SAAF bird that should be a very colorful model.

Airfix also released a new 1/72nd Spitfire kit, a Mk.IXc I believe, and I hear it's a good kit as well. Airfix has several more new kits to deliver this year including a Spitfire Mk XII, Bf.109E, BaE Hawk T1, Bf.109E Trop, and a couple of Westland Lynx kits—army and navy versions—and all in 1/48th.

There are quite a few new subjects for ship modelers for 2010. Revell is showing a 1/700th *Tirpitz* and *Bismarck* set for a Summer release. Airfix has a 1/350th scale Trafalgar class submarine.

Fine Molds has a really good looking 1/72nd IJN A-Target Type A Midget Submarine kit. That was the type used at Pearl Harbor. AFV Club has a 1/350th scale IJN I-58 Submarine, late type. Pit Road also lists an IJN I-58 in the same scale but at a slightly higher price. Pit Road also has a 1/350th 2nd. Class Cargo Ship with PE as well. Could be that PE makes up the price difference.

For armor builders, Revell of Germany lists as new a Wiesel 2 Le Fla Sys (*Waffentrager Ozelot*) in 1/35th that's set for a fourth quarter release. They will also release an 8.8cm Flak 36 und Sd.Anh. 202 in 1/72nd, probably in September.

AFV Club has a number of new releases on the way, most due in February. These include a 1/35th M35A2 "deuce-and-a-half" Cargo Truck and a Swedish Army Ikv-91 Tank. AFV also has some figure sets for those armor diorama or vignette builders. Among these are an M5AI Light Tank Crew, an Operation Iraqi Freedom PKO Figure, and an Operation Iraqi Freedom Sniper Team. Again, these are slated for a February release.

A few months ago, Tamiya released a 1/48th kit of the Austin Light Utility Truck. I believe it could be built in two or three versions, RAF and USAAF, since they were used around the air fields during WWII. Now it appears that a company called SKP Model has brought out the same vehicle in 1/35th scale and in either RAF or USAAF markings. No word on the price but again, look for it in either February or March.

And speaking of Tamiya, their next release for $1/48^{\text{th}}$ is a German *Hanomag* Sd.Kfz.251/1 Ausf.D "*Stuka Zu Fuss*" with rocket launcher. That should be a good subject for the scale. I may want one.

That's all for this month. See you at the meeting Thursday. Be sure to bring a model, finished or in progress $\frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}$.


