


Flyhawk German Battleship Scharnhorst 1943 (Premium Edtion)

an In-Box Review by Rick Herrington



Any Kreigsmarine ship modeler in 1/700th scale has built Tamiya's Scharnhorst model. Did you know that the initial release date for the kit was in 1975? Although it's a fine kit and I still like to keep 1 or 2 of the kit's in my ship stash to raid for the single 20mm guns to say the kit is long in the tooth is definitely speaking the truth.

A Chinese company known for their fine photo etch kits Flyhawk has graced us with a new release of the Deutsche Kreigsmarine (DKM) Scharnhorst in 1/700th scale. This will be a replacement for the Tamiya kits in your stash and what a fine replacement it is!



The kit comes in two versions. The first is FH 1148 which is the no frills, less expensive version of the kit. It doesn't include the photo etch sheets that come with FH1148S which is the premium version.

I will be reviewing the premium version.

There are two or more sprues of each of the ones I illustrate in this article except for parts like the funnel and the major upper superstructure peices.

This proved fortunate as I am building a representation of the Scharnhorst as he looked during the channel dash. He has some extra quad 20mm flak guns added to the deck and I was able to use the extras that came with the kit to represent those.

The kit represents Scharnhorst as he appeared in the battle of North Cape. This was the ship's last battle.

The kit represents the 1943 version of the ship with all the upgrades to the radars.

Before you start building be sure to research the time period you want to represent. Scharnhorst's appearance and camouflage changed a great deal during her short but noteable career.



First up is the hull and deck bits. The ship can be built in either water line or full hull versions. There is a hull cut out on the lower hull that has a peice that fits into it. Since this is the bow of the kit really haven't worked out what its function is.




The deck and hull detail is very fine.





Here are the separate major parts like the funnel, main deck, rear deck and hangar parts.







The detail on the funnel is amazing. Not only is there molded on detail for the various steam pipes that go up and down the funnel but the kit includes several separate pipes that are glued on to the funnel to add more detail.










The picture above illustrates the bow cut out section, aircraft hangar and range finder bases.










The previous photo shows one of the sprues that has boats, fire hose reels and 20mm flakvierlings. The flakvierlings (four barreled flak guns) are kits in themselves and you will need your Optivisor to put them together.



Searchlight and bridge range finder sprues.



Now for the juicy part....the weapon sprues. I was very impressed with the detail on the main armament turrets. No additional photo etch parts needed. The plastic barrel sprue includes barrels with blast bags and without. The premium version includes brass barrels but without the blast bags.



11 inch gun barrel close up. These are the ones without the blast bags. Off to the left you can see the single 5.9 inch barrels.

Secondary turrets and barrels with blast bags. If you do the late version two of the secondary turrets have quad 20mm's nounted on platforms on top of two of the twin turrets.




Brass barrels for the 11 inch and 5.9 inch gus as well as brass parts to construct the mast.



Torpedoe tubes, twin 37 AA mounts and single 20mm guns along with quad 20mm bases.




Additional photo etch sheets included in the Premium Version of the Scharnhorst kit.





The photo with the blue background is the photo etch sheet which comes with the standard no frills kit.



The decal sheet with flags and bits that can make up the swastikas painted on his deck. The yellow sheet is a mask that applies to the deck to help you paint the red squared on the deck.



Example of aerial identification flag painted on the deck. I used some swastika decals robbed from an aircraft sheet for the crosses. This deck has been sprayed with gloss coat after the decal was set. Some touch up on the white border seems in order.



Two sheets of fairly easy to follw instruction sheets. On the second page is a color scheme for the camouflage Scharnhorst wore when she was sunk. There is also a guide for painting the AR-196 float plane.



Finally Flyhawk includes a peice of frameable art with the kit depicting Scharnhorst with star shells illuminating him in the cold artic night.



All in all this is just an extraordinay kit for 1/700th scale. In the process of building the kit I kept saying to myself "This should be in 1/350th scale."

There are rumors that Flyhawk is going to jump into the 1/350th market but for right now they are rumors.


Hopefully Flyhawk will take the plunge and offer us a world class 1/350th Scharnhorst. Their 1/700th Scharnhorst is already a world class kit.

The Great Other


ICM Plastic Model Kits is offering the figure modeler an additional 'Game of Thrones' character for their collection. The previously release was an excellent 1/16th scale plastic kit of the 'King of the Night.' also known as the Ice Zombie King (or is it Zombie Ice King?) from the Game of Thrones series on HBO.

The Great Other, within the faith of Sailor, is also known as The Lord of Darkness, Soul of Ice, or God of Night and Terror within the folklore of the Game of Thrones saga. Or, you can just call him Al!

This companion figure is molded in fifteen, light gray plastic parts with a three-piece display base, in black styrene, and a single clear bit for the the Great Others weapon of choice. This spear is tipped with 'Dragon Glass'. (Obsidian, for those that may be unfamiliar.). Additionally, ICM includes a painting guide and an 8x11 glossy, Hollywood-type print of the box art that is suitable for framing. Or, I suppose you could use it as a painting guide.





There aren't any assembly instructions per say, just remember that the torso goes above the legs. Assembly is pretty simple, although I did get the wrong feet on the wrong legs.

Just kidding. It was the hands that I had trouble with.

Oh wait, those are molded to the arms. Nevermind!



The right arm, that is sculpted grasping the spear, does have the fore fingers of the Great Others hand molded as a separate piece. This engineering allows for a more realistic pose of that hand holding the spear. Nice touch on ICM's part.



The legs are molded as one piece so no goofy seam to deal with. Those attach to the upper torso to which you glue on both arms. The aforementioned hands are nicely sculpted and show a great deal of animation as does the rest of the kit parts. There are four parts that comprise the Great Others leather lion cloth that get attached and then you're pretty much done with assembly.

The base is molded in three pieces: an oval base, a bottom, and a top bit which has a rough cast texture. This engineer affords you, dear modeler, the opportunity to add some weight into that pocket to keep the finished piece from being top heavy. Another excellent call on the part of ICM.



The rest of the figure goes together without too much muss or fuss. There are some gaps here and there that will require a bit of putty to fill but nothing out of the ordinary. The gap between the torso and the legs is a bit fiddly to correct but keep in mind that the figures nicely sculpted loin cloth covers almost all of that join. One difficulty about that loin cloth...it doesn't fit all that great. The problem is easily fixed with some crafty modeling skills: scraping, sanding, and lots of test fitting.



The suggested paint colors supplied by ICM are for Revell and Tamiya paints. One aspect that I always find amusing about foreign manufacturers is the translation of their native tongue into English. In this case, 'suggested colors' in Ukrainian translates into 'used colors' in English. This is, after all, a fantasy figure so any colors that you choose to use will be the 'used colors'.

So, not that far off the mark.

Painting began with the base

Painting began with the base. The base is molded in black plastic and could be sprayed with a clear coat of some sort and you'd be well with your rights to do that. I went with a coating of acrylic craft paints in a super-secret blend of Burnt Umber, Raw Umber, and Raw Sienna. (Actually it was a small dollop of this one and a extralarge dollop of that one, and a tiny bit of another.) After drying I did coat the whole thing in a clear coat of some sort.



The engineering of the base (with its separate top) gave me the opportunity to try a technique that I've been trying to prefect with varying degrees of success. Namely creating a realistic looking snow field. I used a small piece of matting that was cut to size, glued to the top, and then teased into proper shape. The material in question is the padding that quilters use when... you know...quilting. It should be available, by the yard, from your friendly, neighborhood fabric or craft store. [Modeling Tip #678: One yard will more than enough for several projects.]

The figure was completely assembled and given several coats of white primer. Great Other was then given a blue wash using Metallic Blue from Vallejo's Mecha color line diluted with alchol. After drying and a coat of clear to seal the wash, highlights and shadows were applied using blue and white acrylics.





The hair and beard received some highlights of blue and desert sand and then an overall wash of gray to blend it all together.

The loin cloth was painted, off the figure, with a concoction of Raw Sienna, Burnt Umber, and Raw Umber that wasn't thoroughly mixed. Some highlights and shadows were added and then the lin cloth was attached to the figure and given a white wash from AK/ Mig.



In the Game of Thrones series, the army from "beyond the wall" all have striking blue eyes. I replicated that look with Tamiya's clear blue.

Great Other's spear is, again, molded in clear plastic. There are some nicely molded details on the tip as well as the shaft of the spear. I painted that shaft with that same special blend of acrylic craft paints mentioned earlier and wrapped the shaft with strips of Tamiya masking tape.

ICM suggests that the spear tip be clear but I chose to go with a 'Dragon Glass-look' and painted the tip with a black wash (Vallejo), allowed that to dry thoroughly, and then clear coated the pointy end with Modge Pog.



One aspect of this release that provided a bit of consternation is the MSRP.

After a somewhat exhaustive search, the suggested manufacturers price ranges from approximately 21.00 USD from Hannant's to upwards of 44.00 USD from Squadron.!? I'd strongly suggest that you Support Your Local Hobby Shop and buy this splendid figure kit from them.

There were some great ship models in 1/350th and 1/700th scale










This Mars Lander was Best Science Fiction subject.

Rick also brought in his in progress 1/700th Flyhawk DKM Scharnhorst.




Milton Bell brought in his 1/48th AMT A-20.

We all go to the model shows for varying reasons – some to socialize with their peers. Some to compete for fabulous trophies and bragging rights. Some to learn more about modeling, or to meet famous veteran heroes and take pictures with them.

Fertilizer.

We go to blow cash in the vendor room. The hobby industry has gone absolutely Amanda-Bynes-on-happy-pills-crazy with the prices lately. Hundred, hundred-fifty, two-hundred dollar kits abound. Even the old, nostalgic Revellograms that used to land in our hot childhood hands for next to nothing are twenty bucks retail now. It's crazy. Who's to blame? Us! We demand more and more fidelity of detail, and photoetch and resin, and slide-molding and 3d printing. Is it any wonder that our hightech demands have resulted in high-tech prices? I think not.

Here we are, blogging and blogging about how bad a piece of crap this kit is, and how great that one is, and the model companies, like sheep...or maybe like sharks...follow the demand, but demand more money in return. So what is the educated, smart, and...if you are like me...cheap...modeler to do?

We avoid retail like it was a feverish guy in Wuhan hospital. We go to the shows.... to that magical place of happiness – the VENDOR room!

Ah, just smell it – piles and piles of styrene, just waiting for our loving ministrations. Table after table of F-18's, battleships, Ferraris and Panthers, Flak guns and dinosaurs...the critter, not the guy behind the table. Kits piled high, one on top of another.

Oh, GAWD it's lovely!

There are two types of vendors that typically populate the shows. Each can be recognized by sight, merchandising method, and look of desperation.

The less-desperate-looking guy is the pro – the retail guy who happens not to own a brick-and-mortar store. His "establishment" is a trailer that he backs up to the Courtney Love Convention Center on the morning of the show. Let's atart with 1/144th scale.

Trumpeter is releasing an Avro Vulcan British bomber.



Moving on to 1/72nd scale first up are a couple of helicopters.

LF Models is releasing a Sikorsky HO3S-1G in US Coast Guard livery.



Atlantis has been re-releasing vintage kits. This monthe they have one that was Aurora and one that was Monogram. The Auora kit is a Sikorsky HH-3 Jolly Green Giant.



The Monogram kit being re-released by Atlantis is a UH-1 Huey Chopper. There are two complete kits in the box one decked out as a Vietnam era gunship (green plastic) and the other as a fire fighting chopper molulded in red plastic.



IBG Models is releasing a PZL.37B Los in Romanian service.



Two new tools from Italeri in 1/72nd scale. The first is an F86F.



Next up from Italeri is an all new F-35B



Hasegawa has re-released their gettingon-a-bit B-17G kit with the markings of 'A Bit O Lace'. So far as I know, the new decals are the only change from earlier releases, and in fact seem to be a re-release as well as this is the scheme the kit came out with back in the '70's. Considering the vintage, look for fine raised panel lines.



Amodel has re-released their 2019 Diamond Da-42MNG, which is a slightly odd-looking light twin civil aircraft. The kit reportedly has some new parts.



Hasegawa re-released their F-104J/F-104DJ Starfighter with new decals.



Hasegawa has re-released their F-4EJ Phantom II in '501 SQ Final Year 2020' markings. Nothing new here but the markings.



Hasegawa has re-released their Ki-45kai Koh Toryu (Nick) with new decals. The last parts upgrade to this kit was in 2003, so consider it accordingly.



Revell has announced a Hawk T-1 kit. I can't find much on this, but it appears to be a rerelease in new markings.



Let's begin the new releases in 1/48th scale with a couple of releases from Eduard.

First is an Il Magnifico Hanriot HD.1 in Italian Service.



Next from Eduard is an ME-109 G10 Erla. What makes this Messerschmidt different than any other you ask?

The oil cooler was made wider and shallower, and the plumbing was redesigned. This led to a new wider and shallower oil cooler housing, and permitted the lines of the lower forward cowl to be smoothed, eliminating the cheek bulges. The main cowl contours were modified too, as were various panels. This, in turn, led to different shapes for the gun troughs. A new, larger supercharger intake was installed. The squared-off port-side fairing was another key identifying factor.

In can be argued that the Erla-built G-10 was the ultimate Bf 109. It was lighter in weight, more streamlined and actually performed better than the Bf 109 K-4, making it the fastest of all the Messerschmitt Bf 109s.

It was also manufactured at the Erla Werke located in Leipzig, thus the Erla ear mark.



The ProfiPACK edition of the Bf 109G-10 comes with five marking options focused on 109s produced by Erla Werke in Leipzig. It includes color photo-etch parts and painting masks.

Eduard has re-released their 2015 Spitfire Mk.VIII Profipack kit.



Hasegawa has re-released their 1993 F/A-18D Hornet in a 'Night Attack' version, with some new parts.



Hasegawa has re-released their 2004 F-8E(FN) Crusader in 'French Navy' markings.





Hasegawa has re-released their 2005 Harrier GR.5 supposedly with updated/new parts.



Italeri has re-released their MiG-23MF/BN Flogger, based on their 2019 re-release of the same basic kit.



Airfix ix up next with a new P51D



Next up in 1/48th scale is a release from Copper State Models a Handley Page 0/400. This was a WW1 night bomber.



Finally in 1/48th scale for this month is another Italeri release, a Mig 23 MF/BN Flogger.





"Hasegawa re-released a Special Edition F-15J Eagle with an accompanying 1/20 scale JASDF Female Pilot Figure. This re-box is unremarkable, other than the inclusion of the figure. I'll leave it to you to figure out why 1/20th scale?

Hasegawa has a couple of offerings due out this month. in 1/200th scale. The first is a Boeing 747-400 in Northwest Airlines markings. The plastic is a re-release, but from what I can determine this kit is now hard to find, so a re-issue is a good thing.







Hasegawa has also re-issued their 2013 KC-767J and E-767 kit in JASDF markings.



Last but certainly not least the final flyer for this month is a new release from Kitty Hawk in 1/32nd scale a new tool Mirage 2000C.





Shipping News By Rick Herrington

Let's start off this month with the 1/700th scale releases.

Orange Hobby is up first with a release of HMS Royal Oak. This was the British battleship made famous by Gunther Prien and his U-47. Royal Oak was sunk in the Royal Navy's home port of Scapa Flo by U-47.

The second release ifrom Dragon Hobby is the same Sdkfz 7 with a Flak 36 37mm mounted on it.




Moving on to 1/35th we have a lot to get to this month. Tamiya is up first with two new ones. The first is a French R-35 infantry tank.

MiniArt known for their 2.2 million part kits is releasing a PzKpw 4 Ausf J.




ICM not known for being a slacker on their parts count is releasing Tyagach Model 1944 Recovery vehicle based on the T-34 chassis.

It Figures

Hello fellow miniature people fanatics, and welcome to February's edition of It Figures. First up, are a few new offerings from ICM Holdings.

Let's start with a 1/16th scale plastic figure of a modern female British Police Officer. This figures comes in 9 separate pieces with modern armament, and gear, including a MP5 submachine gun, and a Tazer, as well as a sidearm. The kit also provides a small plastic plinth to mount your finished figure, with a choice of different types of sidewalk.





Also in 1/16th is ICM's Roman Centurion. ICM's line of plastic 1/16th figures is really getting diverse with both modern and classical figures. This one is again nicely detailed, but since a Centurion was generally a senior officer, I don't know that the equipment provided to this figure is correct. I don't believe they would have been armed like a foot soldier of the line. Still, this figure appears to be nicely done, and comes with its own plinth for proper display.



ICM also has a new release of World War I figures, this time some early war French Zouaves in 1/35th. The Zouave regiments consisted almost entirely of people from the French colonies in North Africa. These units were known as much for their colorful uniforms, as they were for their bravery in combat. The Zouave units served France with distinction during the war, and while they did spend the early months in their bright uniforms, these were replaced with the standard khaki uniforms in 1915. These figures from ICM come in nice poses with nicely detailed uniforms would come in handy for any early war diorama.






Miniart has some modern figures coming out. This time around, they've continued with their modern AFV crews with a set of four British crewmen. The figures are standing in a commander's cupola, or seated in the driver's seat. Each one is nicely detailed in modern summer gear.

The second set from Miniart is listed as "coming soon" and consists of 5 Afghan civilians, two males, with an elder seated, a young boy, and a mother with a small daughter in her arms. The mother wears the traditional Afghan burqa covering her entire body, which if perfect for those of us who don't like painting faces. These figures would go well with the host of modern infantry offerings available.

Finally, from Tommy's War, we have four new World War I figures in 54mm (1/32nd) scale. Two tankers from the 8th Bn Tank Corps, Amiens 1918 a Private in coveralls and a Corporal in full kit and wearing a helmet. The other two figures represent a Private from the 8th Bn Lincolnshire Regiment 1918, and a Chaplain attached to the same Battalion. As always with Tommy's War figures, these resin figures are perfectly detailed and look great.



Although each is listed as belonging to a particular unit, the figures are shown in the usual kit and equipment for the 1917-18 period and be perfectly acceptable to list as any English, Welsh, Irish, Australian, New Zealand, South African or Lowland Scottish Regiment.
