

A History of 1/48th P51-H model kits By: Boyd Waechter

The sleek, sexy, killer look of the P-51D Mustang went out the window when North American Aviation's designers came up with its replacement, the P-51H.

To me, it's always looked like a pregnant P-51D with its enlarged fuselage and taller tail assembly. The P-51H was the final aircraft built in a series of "Light Weight Mustangs" that included the XP-51F, XP-51G, XP-51J, and finally the P-51H. These came about via a set of Royal Air Force specs which called for an aircraft that could roll with the Focke-Wulf 190 and also take on the Mitsubishi Zero in the Pacific, as well as an extended range Mustang. But, by the time the P-51H went into production (1946), the war was over and the RAF had no interest in the airplane.

A single example was allocated to the RAF (serial no. KN987) and rumored to have been painted in Olive Drab and Dark Green over Neutral Gray, but records show that it never went overseas and the airplane was eventually flown to MacDill Field in Florida to await it's disposition. There is currently a P-51H warbird painted in similar markings, but I believe these markings were conceptualized and not actually applied to the single airplane the RAF purchased.

The P-51H had a vastly improved Merlin engine, so it was faster and its climb rate was much superior to that of the P-51D, but it still did not have the range needed because no fuselage internal fuel tanks were incorporated in the design. 2000 P-51Hs were initially ordered, to be made up of 555 NA-126s and 1445 NA-129s with minor differences. All of these planes were to be built at North American's Inglewood factory. An additional 1629 examples were ordered from NAAs Dallas plant under the charging number of NA-124, By the end of its production run, only the 555 P-51H NA-126 models were produced used by the USAF, Air National Guard, SAC, All-Weather Flying Service, and two airframes ended up with the USN doing work with the Grumman F10F-1 Jaguar testing program and carrier qualification tests.

The last P-51H rolled off the production line in 1946. No P-51M's were ever produced. Currently, there are four known survivors, two in flyable condition and two are on static display in museums, one of which is at Lackland AFB in San Antonio, though in pretty poor shape after being outside in the weather for the past 50 years.

Per Scalemates, the first 1/48th scale P-51H ever produced was by Premier Model Company, an all plastic kit, though John Burn's book has it listed as 1/49th scale.



It was produced in 1958-1959 era and a very crude kit, only slightly resembling a P-51H Mustang.

This kit was one of 6 or 7 1/48th to 1/54th scale aircraft kits this company made.

Premier also made a few car kits and I have been told they were very crude as well. There was speculation that Aurora based their kit from these molds, but this

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The next 1/48th scale P-51H I could find information on was done by Hawk, also produced in the mid to late 1950's. It too is an all plastic kit with decals, but that is all I know about it.

This model is not to be confused with their popular P-51D Mustang kit that was first released in 1962 as an all new tool and which was rereleased multiple times by Hawk and Testors over the years.



Probably the most well known kit is the Aurora 1/48th P-51H which was marketed only as a P-51 Mustang, though the box top had it shooting down a Focke-Wulf 190 seemingly to represent a P-51D. It was first released in 1958 in very thick, hard, silver plastic with the markings imprinted into the plastic. It could also double as a hand axe. Although not very well detailed, it was fairly accurate in basic shape and the best of those produced in the late 1950's. I always thought the box art was pretty cool, especially for a 11 or 12 year old and it was the first Mustang model I ever built.

This kit originally came out in 1957, but was released three times, in 1958, 1965, and 1968, each one having different box art and labeling. The one shown is the 1968 release.

We'll now fast forward a few years and in the late 1970's, a vacuform company named Eagles Talon produced a 1/48th kit of the P-51H Mustang, limited run and distributed via mail order only. Eagles Talon was eventually absorbed into Wings 48th owned by Don Bennett of Don's Model Works, a company that produced a large line of very high quality 1/48th scale vacuforms.

After Mr. Bennett died in 2011, the company fell into the hands of his son, Chuck Bennett, who elected to close the business. A post on Hyperscale indicates that Don Bennett did not rerelease the P-51H under the Wings 48th label which he may have been retooling upon his death.

Editor's note: After a diligent search for an image of Eagles Talon and Wings 48th P-51H your editor came up with NADA. Even Scalemates which is my goto when I can't find an image doesn't have one.



The next 1/48th scale P-51H seems to be a bit more progressive produced by Historic Plastic Models (kit 48-005), more commonly known simply as HiPM. The kit comes on three trees of dark grey plastic, with two injection-molded canopies - one open, one closed - a fret of photo-etch brass for detail parts, and Propagteam decals for two aircraft of the 67th Fighter Group in Alaska in 1946-47, and two aircraft of the Massachusetts Air National Guard, one from the "Irish" and one from the "Polish squadrons. By today's standards, this kit was pretty crude and has a very thin wing cord that is totally unacceptable. It would take a great deal of work to finish this kit in a form which somewhat looks like a P-51H. Definitely not recommended. HiPM is a Czech Republic company and this

kit was primarily sold in Europe, though it could be found in some specialty shops that imported kits like this to unsuspecting U.S. customers.



In 1996, Collect-Aire produced a 1/48th scale resin kit of the F-51H whose masters may have been done by LF Models and cast here in the U.S. by Loon Models. It was not a bad kit and the shape was fairly accurate, but it had a lot of fit problems, more than it should have for the price (about \$75 in1996).

I tried to build this kit and it almost drove

. It was my first attempt at building full resin kit and the whole experience was not good. I ended up keeping the nice decal sheet that came in the kit and throwing the rest of it away. Three months of time and energy down the tubes.

It now resides somewhere in one of Fort Bend County's land fill's, probably doing more good there than in my stash of Mustang kits.



In 1994, Classic Airframes Resin was born and one of their first full plastic kits was a 1/48th scale P-51H released in the late 90's. It was probably the first, really decent kit of this airplane in this scale. It came with a resin cockpit which was highly detailed and may have had a resin wheel well, I can't remember.

I built this kit about 2005 without too much difficulty, though the fit of the parts was pretty bad. I think they either used resin or copper molds, because there was a lot of trash on the surface of the parts, all were given a good wet sanding prior to painting. I elected to build a P-51H from the 111th Fighter Intercept Squadron (FIS) that had been stationed at Ellington Field in the mid-50's. This model now resides in the U.S.S. Lexington Model Museum in Corpus Christi.

Now we fast forward to 2019 when a Ukrainian model company, Modelsvit, announces and then releases an all new, state of the art, P-51H Mustang. Imported by Sprue Brothers (\$48), their first shipment of these kits sold out in less than a day. It wasn't until February 2020 that I was able to finally obtain one via Freetime Hobbies. To say I was immediately impressed would have been an understatement. It has nine trees of medium gray parts, very fine surface detail, inscribed panel lines, and every bit as good as the new Eduard P-51D Mustangs. It also has a tree of clear parts containing a two part open canopy and a one part closed canopy, your choice. Also included is a small fret of photo etched parts and a clear parts mask set.

The decal sheet has markings for four aircraft, three Air National Guard airplanes (Texas, New Hampshire, and Massachusetts) and a RAF camouflaged P-51H, KN987, that was purchased by the U.K. but never delivered. This kit has a complete and very well detailed cockpit and set of wheel wells, a set of underwing auxiliary fuel tanks and rockets, and separated ailerons, main flaps, control surfaces, and rudder. Overall, this is a truly excellent P-51H Mustang kit. I might mention that Caracal Decals has just released a 1/48th scale sheet of decals for the P-51H, evidentially as a result of how popular the Modelsvit kit has become.

Modelsvit has also announced an all new 1/48th F-82 Twin Mustang for release in 2020 or 2021. If it is as good as the P-51H, then it should be an outstanding kit.



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
Although not a 1/48th scale plastic kit, l wanted to make mention of another very early P-51H (3/8" scale) produced by Jetco Models in the very early 50's, a wooden control line model. In this ad, it appears that one of these models won a series of

national championships in the mid-50's. I wonder why Jetco decided to base their kit on the P-51H and not the P-51D which would have been as well known and a much better looking Mustang?



In summary, it appears that there have now been eight 1/48th P-51H Mustang kits produced in plastic, far more than I would have realized when I set out to write this review.

Clipped, not Stirred How I survived building AFV Club's 1/144th Fleet Air Arm F4U Corsair

Even though by and large I am an armor modeler these days, from time to time I still build kits with propellers. Fleet Air Arm (FAA) subjects fascinate me ever since my first trip to their museum at Yeovilton over a decade ago. When AFV Club brought out their 1/144th scale F4U series of kits in 2018 I knew I had in FAA livery. The kit I purchased was #14408 which was the second in the series. Aside from the decal markings, the only difference between the earlier release (#14406) and mine is the wing fold option. As I like all things folded on my naval aircraft models, getting this version was a no brainer.

Building the Kit


Since most, if not all, WWII Royal Navy carriers had a lower clearance in the hangar decks (possibly due to the fact their flight decks were armored), it was necessary to reduce the wing span of a standard Corsair by eight inches in order to clear the deckhead. As a result, the clipped wings became a distinctive feature of FAA Corsairs.



The clipping of the kit's wing tips was simple and easy: just cut along the panel lines where the red arrows are pointing.



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Be sure to fill the clipped interior with

Oh well. At least I know they are there in case of a surprise inspection by the quartermaster...

By the way, AFV Club grossly simplifies the wing fold mechanism to the point that they are beyond erroneous and almost fictitious. I might be tempted to rebuild all that if I were ten years younger, but with my declining

eyesight and aging cardiac muscles, there is no way I can pull it off in this scale and live to tell another day!

However, should you want to give it a go, I recommend replicating Tamiya's simple yet elegant way of depicting the wing fold in its 1/48th Corsair kit.

In order to make painting easier, I left off the installation of the wings. I also scratch built two holding rods to keep the folded wings in place. Each rod (7.6mm in length) was made from 0.8mm aluminum tubing with a slightly longer 0.5mm brass wire inside bended at an angle on one end.



They were scaled down versions of part B1 found inside Tamiya's 1/48th Corsair kit.






I was surprised AFV Club did not provide them. Honestly, I cannot fathom how the wings can stay upright in their folded positions without the support of these rods.

Painting, Decaling, and Pin Wash

Prior to the summer of 1945, all carrier based Corsairs in the British Pacific Fleet were painted the two-tone camo scheme of Olive Drab (some say Dark Slate Gray) and Extra Dark Sea Gray in disruptive pattern on top and Sky undersides. Since all the aircraft colors that I own are by Gunze, I used H78 for Olive Drab, H333 for Extra Dark Sea Gray and H74 for Sky. Masking was done with Silly Putty.



The rest of the painting was done by hand with either Reaper or Scale75 acrylic paints. Again I found Tamiya's 1/48 Corsair kit most helpful; its painting instructions are far superior (not to mention more accurate) than AFV Club's.

After a heavy coat of Future, I was ready for decaling.

Finding SEAC roundels with bars in 1/144th scale was more difficult than I thought.

Eventually I was able to locate a set from a Spitfire sheet (144-018) by Print Scale. They were very thin but reacted well with Solvaset. Using what was available on that sheet, I made my model look like one of 1834 SQN's Corsairs operating aboard HMS Victorious. The Hamilton Standard logos on the propeller blades came from AFV Club's decal sheet. In this scale they may look fine from a distance, but under 2x magnification I noticed all of them were printed out of



After I sprayed on another coat of Future to protect the decals, it was time to do some pin washing.

Instead of using my trusted artist oils, I experimented with two of Tamiya's Panel Line Accent Color products. I used Gray over Sky and Black over the camo colors. I came to realize these Panel Line washes are nothing but thinned down enamel paints. While easy to use (each bottle cap has a build-in brush just like Extra Thin Cement), you have to shake the bottles frequently in order to get a consistent amount of paint on the brush or else, the pigment will sink to the bottom, and you'll be applying nothing but thinner on your model.

The solvent Tamiya uses as thinner in these washes is unusually "hot." Without a strong acrylic based gloss coat (use Tamiya X-22 or Future to protect the base coat, the thinner will eat through the paint underneath and create a mess!

One must use these Tamiya washes with extreme care. In my opinion, artist oils are still the best and safest for pin washing.

Wings Installation

Once I finished the pin wash, I applied a coat of Flat Clear (XF-86) over everything and began installing the folded wings. My advice to everyone is to take a couple of aspirins beforehand in case of any heart attack during the process! I damn near had two; the first time when the glue failed to keep the left wing attached, and the second time when I realized the holding rod on the right was 1mm too short!

After much tweaking and brute gluing, I managed to get the wings on tight. Not exactly my best work but it'll do. Phew!

The Base

The base was a wooden block I found in the discount aisle at one of the chain arts-and-crafts stores.

I sprayed it Flat Black and glued a portion of 1/144th HMS Glory Deck (by Noy's Miniatures) on top. Easy peasy!

Onward!

It's been a while I built an aircraft model, and I'm quite happy with the turn out of my tiny FAA Corsair.





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Now back to building and painting things with tracks, wheels, and legs!



I detailed the wrecked front-end of the space ship with some extra bits from the spares box.

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Randy Bumgardner has been busy . Here's a couple of shots of his 1/32nd scale P-40.












Dave Edgerly Here ya go, My first Gundam kit. Same scale as the LEGO Saturn V Apollo 11. And quite the operatic star tenor.




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

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We have a couple of finished projects from Milton Bell,, a Yak 3 and a P-51H.





1/32nd Scale:

Revell has announced a Tempest V based on the Special Hobby kit, which based on the reviews I've found was a good one. Apparently other than a new box and decals, it is unchanged from Special Hobby's last release about two years ago. What I don't know is whether it contains the photo-etch and resin parts that went with the upgraded SH kit.



1/48th Scale:

DoraWings has announced a new-tool Republic P-43 Lancer. Photos of the test build are on the web, and it looks very nice. It is reported to include decals for USAAF, Chinese, and RAF markings. The test build photos showed a bare-metal, prewar color scheme.




Eduard is re-releasing their Bf 109G in a Limited Edition "Wilde Sau" night fighter scheme with some new parts.





Eduard is also re-releasing their 2004 Morane Saulnier Type N in a Profipack edition with new decals. Kit reviews of the original release indicate a well detailed kit but a challenging build.



Fine Molds is releasing a B-399 Buffalo IJA w/Maintenance Scene. This depicts a captured

"Buffalo" in Japanese markings. The aircraft kit is Tamiya, with Nano Aviation Series mechanics, fuel drums, and maintenance stand.



In like manner, Fine Molds has announced a Bf 109E-7 IJA w/Maintenance Scene , again based on the Tamiya kit, with Nano Aviation Series mechanics, maintenance bench, and so on.



ICM has announced a B-26C-50 Invader in Korean War markings with some new parts. This adds one more to a series of kits representing variants of this famous aircraft.



Italeri is re-releasing their H-34A Pirate/ UH-34D USMC with new decals. Last released in 2016, this is a timely re-pop.

Kinetic is re-releasing an Israeli AF Nesher combo kit with new parts and decals. Either the single or two seat variant can be built.



Kitty Hawk has announced a new-tool Su-27 Flanker B, which is the initial production version of this aircraft. This one's so new I couldn't find any reviews of it at all. Indications on the web are that this is the lead aircraft of a three-version series. More on that in future issues.



Modelsvit has announced a new-parts rerelease of their 2015 Yak-9 as a Yak-9TD.



Revell has announced a re-release of their 2018 Beaufighter as a Mk.1F Nightfighter, with some new parts and new decals.



1/72nd Scale

Amodel is re-releasing the BPK kit of the Challenger CL-600 executive jet, with new decals. Reviews of the BPK kit were positive, and it includes a full interior, which is unusual for transport-type jets of this size.



Hasegawa is re-releasing their vintage B-47E Stratofortress in the markings of the '1000th' production aircraft.

This kit was last released in 2016. It is a bit dated, with raised panel lines and minimal inaccurate cockpit detail under that big bubble canopy. But it is still the only game in town in this scale.



ICM has announced a MiG-25RU Foxbat two-seat trainer version based on their earlier MiG-25 BM kit. So, although not an entirely newtool model, it does provide parts for a previously unavailable variant of the aircraft.



Italeri is re-releasing their Fiat CR.42 Falco, which first appeared in 2006 and has been released a couple of times since then, but the last release was a number of years ago.



Modelsvit is re-releasing their P1.HH Hammerhead UAV, first released about 2018. This is an interesting Italian-made UAV for those interested in this subject area.





Pit Road has several new releases both WW2 and modern. The first is a USN drestroyer DD-692 Allen M Sumner.




Second up from Pit Road is a modern JMSDF destroyer, the Hauna DDH-141. The kit comes with a fret of Photo etch.

Lots to get to this month so let's get started with 1/700th scale. Aoshima is up first with a couple of IJN battleships. The first is the Fuso as she looked in 1944.




Aoshima's second release is the battleship Mutsu as she looked in 1942. Both of these kits come with metal barrels.






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As someone who builds mostly 1/72 armor, the addition of nice figures in this scale, is always welcome.





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The following is a joint announcement from the San Marcos 2020 Convention Leadership team and the IPMS USA Executive Board.

We jointly appreciate all the feedback we received regarding this year's convention. We've taken your comments and concerns into careful consideration, while maintaining an ongoing dialogue and negotiation with the Embassy Suites convention center in San Marcos. These negotiations have been proceeding carefully due to the significant financial exposure that IPMS would be subject to if we simply decided to cancel the convention unilaterally.

We are now prepared to announce that the 2020 National Convention is officially

canceled. While this may disappoint many, including your authors, we believe it is the prudent, safe and sensible thing to do.

On a more positive note, we have been successful in negotiating the use of the Embassy Suites San Marcos location for the 2023 convention. Therefore, the rotation for the next three years, circumstances permitting, will be Las Vegas in 2021, Omaha in 2022, and San Marcos in 2023. Tentative dates for the 2023 convention will be August 2nd through the 5th. We are currently finalizing details of the contract with Embassy Suites and expect a finalized version within a week.

For those who have registered already for the convention, we will be processing your refunds. For those who have booked hotel reservations at one of the convention center hotels, it will be up to you to cancel those on your own. Vendors will be refunded their money for tables as well through our vendor coordinator, Craig Gregory.

Chapters and individuals who have sponsored contest categories may also receive refunds for their sponsorships.

Again, we want to thank you all for your patience and support during these trying times, and hope that you recognize we have made the best possible decision for all under the circumstances.

Check with your contest chairmen or the event page on the IPMS/USA website before you get in your car!




