The Miniature Gene..

that allows you to appreciate tiny things. Bob has grown into a world-class figure painter and modeler but remains committed to sharing his talent with anyone who wants to improve his modeling skills and always makes an effort to talk to the new guy at the model meetings and make him feel welcome.

Bob is an all-around modeler although his main love is figure painting. He is as skilled at painting

up a Tamiya Matilda as he is a figure of Montezuma or Thor.

Recently I made a trip over to Bob`s. I had a Mandalorian action figure that I wanted some help painting up and I wanted to catch up with

Dekno 1/72nd Consolidated Y1C-` 22 "Fleetster"

A kit review by Ron McCracken



I have long had an interest in U.S. military aircraft of the 1930s, the so-called "Golden Age" of aviation. Kits of subjects from this era have been few, and hard to find. I`m happy to relate that an outfit called Dekno (www.deknomodels.com) has made significant strides in covering this era. The specific topic of this review is their kit of the Consolidated Model 17-2 Fleetster, or the Y1C-22 as it was designated by the Army Air Corps. First I`d like to offer a few words about the company`s product line. So far they seem to stick to 1/72nd scale, and have three product series:

1. Air Racing Series, with subjects like the Travel Air Mystery Ship, the Wedell-Williams racer, the Laird-Turner Meteor, or the Howard DGA-6 "Mister Mulligan", 13 different aircraft at this time.

2. Golden Age Series, which in addition to the Fleetster, has subjects like the Northrop Alpha, Spartan Executive, the Stinson SR-9 or the De-Havilland Leopard Moth, for a total of 22 in the series.

3. Spanish Civil War Series, currently three kits, the Spartan Executive, DeHavilland Hornet Moth, and British Aircraft Eagle 2. This series seems to be alternate markings releases of kits in the other two series.

I will confess that these kits are a bit pricey (anywhere from \$30 to \$50, depending on your source, I got mine from various vendors via ebay). However, that`s actually not too unusual in limited-run stuff.

From an article on the Web I learned that the master patterns for these kits are produced using CAD software and 3-D printers. Happily, any trace of the "layers" often noted in 3-D printing have been removed.

Now, the review of the kit, with some notes about the four others I`ve bought from this company, where appropriate.

First, the kit is molded from a blue-colored resin that is somewhat softer than the more usual tan-colored resin used by other manufacturers.

The quality of molding is excellent with almost no bubbles or voids. Generally speaking, these kits have little flash or other roughness to deal with – certainly no more than you`d encounter on the average limited-run injection molded kit.

The only real difficulty I encountered with the Fleetster kit was removing the excess plastic from the complex exhaust manifold part. Surface detail is excellent – the Fleetster had corrugated aluminum tail surfaces and these were flawlessly executed on the kit. I did encounter one quality control issue on two of the five kits I bought, and that was a slight but noticeable bend in one of the wing panels. Since the two variants of the Fleetster I acquired used the exact same wing

casting, and one had a bend while the other didn`t, my guess is the wings might sometimes get de-molded a bit too quickly. Happily, the resin used responds quite nicely to a hot water (160 degrees F.) bath. Just clamp the wing to a flat, stiff surface, dunk it for about five seconds, then run cold water over it and the problem is solved. Just be sure to adequately pad the clamp jaw where it touches the wing so you don`t get an unintended divot in the surface!

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The more significant quality issue is the clear parts. These, in the five kits I acquired, varied from almost clear to distinctly yellowish in hue puts me in mind of Mach 2 canopy parts. Now,

I always cast my cabin windows in place using clear resin, so for me that`s no problem. Canopies/windshields are another matter. The cockpit canopy on this Fleetster was usable (just). But for my other Fleetster kit, the part will serve only as a master pattern to cast one from clear resin.

Kit engineering is clever. All interior bulkheads and floors are cast integrally with the fuselage halves, so there`s no fussing around with oversize or undersize parts, like most resin or limitedrun kits l`ve attempted. I gave each fuselage half a few wipes over a sanding block to true up the surfaces, otherwise they just go together with no problem.

Small parts like empennage surfaces, landing gear struts, etc. come with locator pins that fit into corresponding holes in the fuselage, so getting things in the right place isn`t difficult. The one difficulty I encountered with the Fleetster was the landing gear. Each gear unit consists of three parts, the shock strut, a V-shaped brace strut, and the wheel/wheel pants. Getting all three components glued together and glued to the fuselage while holding them in proper alignment in all three planes is not for the faint-hearted. I got

it done, but I think I ended up with symmetrical units more due to pure dumb luck than skill.

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My suggestion would be to use very fine wire pins to temporarily attach both strut components to the wheel fairing, then glue everything to the fuselage, and only permanently glue the wire-pinned components once you have everything lined up.

The other assembly problem was the cockpit canopy. If I have to do it over again (and I do, one more Fleetster to go) I`d attach the canopy to the wing before assembling the wing to the fuselage. That will ensure you get the wing correctly located (I got mine about .040 inches too far back).

Decals are of decent quality and thin enough. I discovered that where you need a setting solution Microscale`s Micro Set worked better than Solvaset. However, I only needed setting solution for the decals that went on the corrugated tail fin.

To summarize, Dekno produces decent kits of a wide variety of 1930`s subjects. Although cast in resin, I found them no more of a construction challenge than most limited-run injection molded kits. So, if you have an interest in this era, these are worth looking into.

October 30 in History...

30 Oct, 1922 - Italy Mussolini

1922 : Mussolini, leader of the Fascist, demands that complete control of the government be handed over to his organization or he was prepared to fight his way to power with his army of 800,000 supporters. The King of Italy Victor Emanuel agrees to his demands and allows him to form a cabinet.

30 Oct, 1936 - English Record

1936 : Two new records were broken today when British Airman Capt. James A Mollison made the crossing from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland to Croydon, England in a record 13 hours 17 minutes averaging 160 MPH in his Bellanca Monoplane. He also broke the record from New York to London with a time of 19 hours and 59 minutes.

30 Oct, 1938 - U.S.A. "The War of the Worlds"

1938 : Orson Welles and members of his company touch off mass panic with a CBS dramatic radio adaptation of the 1898 novel "The War of the Worlds" by H.G. Wells. The play was so well performed that newspapers reported listeners believed the broadcast to be real and had incited mass panic. While there is little proof that actual panic ensued, many listeners were disturbed by the realistic broadcast.

30 Oct, 1961 - World`s Largest Nuclear Bomb

1961 : The Soviet Union has exploded the world`s biggest bomb so far nearly 4,000 times more powerful than the atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima in 1945. This is the latest in a series of larger and larger bombs the Soviets have been exploding over the last few years. The United Nations is appealing to both the US and the Soviet Union to end the arms race or risk destroying the planet.

30 Oct, 1974 - Zaire Muhammad Ali

1974 : Muhammad Ali regains The Heavyweight Title by knocking out George Foreman in the eighth round during the fight billed as "Rumble In The Jungle."

30 Oct, 1977 - China Purge

1977 : The Communist party leader of China Hua Kuofeng is continuing his purge of opponents with many thousands of dissidents executed this year.

30 Oct, 1991 - Middle East Peace Conference 1991 : The Middle East peace conference begins in Madrid, and is the first time Israel has sat down with all its Arab neighbours including Palastinians to discuss a peace plan for the Middle East.

30 Oct, 2012 - Hurricane Sandy Devastates US East Coast

2012 : The "super-storm" Sandy hit the US East Coast creating a major disaster area in heavily populated areas like New York City and the coast of New Jersey. President Obama declared a major disaster in the state of New York. Even much of Lower Manhattan lost power.

ICM is also re-releasing their 2020 new-tool PT-17, adding three figures of female American aviation cadets. This ought to be of interest to aircraft modelers with an interest in figures, and vice-versa.



/ICM is also releasing some additional crew figures for the Stearman based on this photo.



1/48th Scale Eduard is releasing a limited edition MiG-19 Farmer based on Trumpeter molds with some new parts.



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Eduard is re-releasing their Spitfire Mk.Ia in a Profipack edition with some new parts.

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 Hasegawa has announced an A6M5 Type
52 Zero in an 'Ace Pilot` version with a figure of Japanese ace Tetsuzo Iwamoto.

ICM is re-releasing their 2020 new-tool 0-2A Skymaster in USN markings with some new parts added.



Kinetic is re-releasing their Harrier kit in two variations – a USMC AV-8A and a Harrier GR.1/GR.3. Same basic kit, different mar kings and possibly some alternative parts.



Revell has announced a re-issue of their aging CH-53G, which has been around since the days when raised panel lines were stateof-the-art. Still, this kit hasn`t seen a re-issue since 2013, so if you missed out then, you`re getting another opportunity to expand your stash!





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Revell has announced re-release of a Tornado ASST 3.1 with new parts and markings. The basic kit originated, per Scalemates, in 1992 under the Italeri brand, and has seen re-issues over the years from Italeri, Eduard, Testors, and Revell.

BPK (Big Planes Kits) has announced a newtool 737-800 in 'Qantas` markings.



Dora Wings is re-releasing their 2019 new-tool Lysander Mk.III with some new parts./



Dora Wings has announced a new-tool Miles M.9A Master. Based on my inability to find anything but CAD images of the model, I consider an October release a bit optimistic but that`s the claim being made.



Eduard has announced a new-tool kit of the Z-37A Servus Chlapci, a Czech agricultural aircraft.



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Hasegawa is re-releasing their Ju 88G-1 in NJG 2 markings. New decals seems to be the only change since the 2017 release of this kit.



Tamiya is re-releasing the 2019 Italeri kit of the F-35B Lightning II with additional parts for more varied armament options, and decals for two Japan-based USN aircraft.



1/144th Scale Zvezda has announced a new-tool Be-200ES twin jet seaplane.



Shipping News By Rick Herrington

Let`s jump right in with a forthcoming release from IBG. I haven`t built anything from this manufacturer but looking at the Interlink it looks like they`ve released 11 other British destroyers in 1/700th scale. If you`re an Anglophile like me it might be worth checking out.

This month`s release from IBG is HMS llex in 1/700th scale. Ilex was an "I" class destroyer and made it all the way through WW2 to be sold for scrap in 1946.



Next up from Orange Hobby is an Italian battleship the Andrea Doria. Looks like an opportunity to build up a battle-wagon with an eye catching finish.



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Two welcome USN cruiser models up next. The first from Pit road is the light cruiser Miami CL-89. The Miami mounted 6 inch guns as her main armament.

The next US cruiser release is the heavy cruiser USS Salem (CA-139) from Veryfire.

Now to the modern stuff and no surprises the releases are JMSDF. First from Pit Road is a destroyer DDH-142 Hiei.

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Moving on to 1/350th scale first we have two releases from Pit Road, both modern JMSDF missile boats. PG-827 Kumataka and PG-824 Hayabusa.





Trumpeter continues its British Cruiser series with the Light Cruiser HMS Calcutta. HMS Calcutta spent most of her career fighting in the Mediterranean where she ultimately met her fate. She was sunk by German air attacks assisting in the evacuation of 6000 British troops from the island of Crete.



Academy is releasing a 1-350th scale DKM battleship Tirpitz. They`re advertising it as a "Pocket Battleship" which it was anything but, being the sister ship to the Bismarck.





In 1/72nd scale we have two releases this month. The first is from Garbuz models and is an oar/sail powered Seagull. Although the box art show a crew of Ukranian Cossacks the model doesn`t come with them.



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Please note that other items shown in the image(s) above are not included with this product.

Last from Das Werk known for their releases of less expensive Takom kits come an unusual and highly refreshing release of the WWI U-boat U-9. U-9 had a distinguished career sinking 18 vessels including 4 British cruisers.

Got a few new 1/72nd scale releases this month so let`s get started with the small stuff. First up from Italeri is a Hanomag 251/1 "Stuka zu Fuss" (Stuka on Foot".



Next from DML comes a T-34 76. This is the 1943 version.



Next from a company called Waltersons we have a Type 10 JGSDF mbt. The kit includes a tank commander figure.





Waltersons is releasing an American Chafee in 1/72nd scale also with a commander figure.



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Pit Road is releasing a Type 74 JGSDF mbt.



Airfix is releasing a dual kit with a Tiger 1 and a Sherman Firefly..oddly enough they`re calling it "Tiger versus Sherman Firefly."



Last in 1/72nd from Attack Kits is a German Phanomen Granit 25H Radiowagen



Moving on to 1/35th scale Takom is up first with a couple of new releases. The first is a Panther G with zimmerit included.



Next from Takom is a modern release a Bergepanzer 2A2.



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Hobby Boss has four new releases this month. The first is a Soviet D-38 artillery tank. This was a prototype tank based on the BT-2 chassis and armed with a 76.2mm howitzer. It was meant for infantry support but never went into producction. Do you think you could find something more obscure Hobby Boss?



The second release from Hobby Boss will excite you Bundewehr Cold Warriors, it`s a Leopard 1A5.



The third release will please IDF fans, it`s a Puma Batash Combat Engineer Vehicle.



The final release from Hobby Boss is based on their previous fine releases of the Swedish CV-90. This kit is the air defense version of the CV-90 designated LVKV-90C armed with a 90mm gun.





/ICM is releasing a Sdkfz 247 Ausf B. This was a German two wheeled reconnaissance vehicle.



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Academy has one release this month. Unfortunately it`s nothing adventurous, it`s a Pzkpfw 3 Ausf J North Africa.



Finally Tamiya has two new releases this month. The first is a semi-new-tool Pzkpfw IV Ausf B with link and link tracks and crew members included.



Last from Tamiya is a German Marder 1 with crew figures.



Last in the column this week is an early Panther G from DML supposedly from the Italian front. The kit comes with infra-red night fighting equipment.

Scale75 has a new vignette available in 1/35th. "Flag over Berlin" looks like it`s supposed to represent the famous image of Russian soldiers hoisting the "hammer and sickle" flag atop the Reichstag on May 1, 1945. This action was done under the direct orders of Joseph Stalin for the propaganda effect of victory over the fascists. In fact, fighting was still happening in Berlin and actually, within the Reichstag building itself as the flag was being raised.

The vignette is nicely detailed and includes three soldiers, one most likely representing a political officer.

Finally, from ICM are a few new kits. First up, is a continuation of their World War 1 series of kits. This time, it`s a Vicker`s machine gun crew and includes two figures in a firing position, with water cans for the cooling system and extra cartridge cases.





ICM recently released two Civil War kits in 1/35th scale. The Confederate soldier set includes 3 soldiers and an officer, while the Union set includes 3 soldiers firing and 1 soldier getting shot. The figures look representative of the armies at the time, with period weapons and gear.
