Bandai's Razorcrest by Rick Herrington

Since painting and weathering is the fun part for me I ordered the less expensive one and just received it last week along with its fellow release a 1/12th scale Mandalorian in Beskar armor. I also got this one in the non-chrome plated version.



I am a huge Star Wars fan and subsequently a Mandalorian fan. When Bandai started making noises about releasing the ship from the Mandalorian (Razor Crest) I was all in. I sent in my hard earned cashola and pre-ordered the model.

It comes in two versions. The first is a silver grey metallic colored one and the second (more expensive of course) is a chrome plated version.





Some of the fun of modelling star ships is doing the research on them.

I had previously taken pictures of the ship from the series itself and had those to work with.


In doing the research I found this kit has been available in Japan since August of this year. The US seems to be last on the list for distribution these days. I also found that both Hasbro and Revell are producing a kit of the ship. The Bandai kit, while well detailed is small, roughly four inches long. The 1/72nd Revell kit is larger and commensurately more expensive. The Bandai kit you should be able to pick up for around thirty bucks. The Revell kit is going for around seventy bucks.

The Hasbro Toy/Kit has an interesting back story. Hasbro is the #2 toy maker in the world and is worth 12 billion dollars. That's Billion with a capital B. In order to produce their version of the Razor Crest they asked fans to Crowdfund the development of the toy at the tune of \$350.00 a pop.



Back to the Bandai kit. Bandai kits are a pleasure to build. They are well engineered and have clear, precise instructions. You usually need to follow the instructions closely to get the desired result.

The picture above is of the unpainted fully assembled Bandai kit. No landing gear provided.

My kit had the instructions printed out on the underside of the box top. This was fine as the construction took all of 15 minutes.

You don't really need cement as the kit snaps together although I used some here and there.

The only beef I had with the kit is that it only came with stickers instead of stickers and water slide decals. To me the stickers look cheesy.

The fun part was the painting. I used AK Mecha colors Dark Metal (69-065) as a base coat and AK Mecha colors Light Steel (69-064) to highlight and dare I say it...dry brush the surface to pop details. I also used Scalecolors Black Metal (SC-63) and Thrash Metal (SC-64) to vary the metallic finish and make it more "real".



The next couple of pictures are of the painted and weathered Bandai Razor Crest.









The most color I used was on the engine after burners. The metal was subject to a great deal of heat and I reflected this with golds, bronzes and orange.

The panels were outlined with Tamiya Panel Line Accent Color (Dark Brown). All in all this was a super fun little project. If you're in the market for a quick break from your regular ship, tank, or airplane try this kit. It will give your Modelling Mojo a quick recharge.



## Kitty Hawk's 1/32nd Kingfisher a build review by Rick Cotton



Once in a while, a kit tests our patience. Now and then, one might push us to the very brink, and thoughts of slamming the model at 500 scale mph into a handy nearby wall may cross our minds. This has happened to me before, as I am sure it has you, too. There comes that point of decision – shelf of doom, parts box, trash heap...or persevere, and see if the beast can actually be built?

Such a kit is the 1/32 Kingfisher float plane by the defunct Kitty Hawk Models. The fit is (not printable), the engineering is (very not printable), and the overall experience is like being (really not printable).

Where do I start? Let's start with the good: The detail, especially the interior, is super, the subject is unique, several colorful versions are possible, and the choice of floats or land wheels is included. . The decals are sharp and thin, and a small sheet of photoetch is included, so it's a pretty comprehensive set.

Now, for the not-so-good. Fit – yeeesh. Every. Single. Hole must be reamed out and enlarged to accept its corresponding locating pin. Some of these pins are best just sliced off. You'll find out. Dry fit and repeat ad nauseum on this sucker. Every stinking piece. You WILL need putty and many grades of sandpaper.

Gigantic attachment points mean you will put the razor saw to work detaching parts....many of which will break, due to the somewhat brittle plastic. Be patient, and KNOW you will have to replace a few. I made my own pitot tube with some very thin piano wire, inserted through a piece of slightly larger wire insulation, and super-glued it into the wing. Unless you are some sort of supermodeling-demigod, you WILL, repeat, WILL have trouble aligning the engine, the three flimsy mounting trusses, the exhaust (good luck figuring that one out), the many little doodads behind the engine, the oil tanks in there, etc., and still be able to attach that assembly in something close to proper alignment to the fuselage. The panels that cover this whole assembly fit OK, if....and this is a BIG "if"... you have everything aligned properly. I did not. I ended up closing up the panels, bidding adieu to all those interior "guts", and living with it.

It's OK, the offending errors are covered up, and will be seen by no one, except me in my nightmares. Once you get to assembling the wings, stabilizers and rudder, the kit lets up on you a bit. However, if you are stupid like me and choose one of the prewar Yellow-wing versions, you will have to spray silver over a LOT of seams. A LOT of them. Be prepared to sand and fill and sand until you do not know what day it is anymore. If you are good with NMF, proceed. If not, there are other paint options in this kit, all of them attractive. Have at it.





Getting the outrigger floats aligned is a special pain – they must be perpendicular with the ground, but the locating points for the interior struts are, shall we say, less than definite. Do NOT forget to drill the locating holes in the bottom of the wing out early on...ask me how I know.

The kit was finished as USS Arizona's #1 aircraft (be sure to use "1" decals on top of the wings, not the "7" the instructions say), and was painted almost exclusively with Tamiya lacquers. The overall silver dope was replicated with Silver Leaf, and the wings are Camel Yellow, all sprayed over Tamiya white primer lacquer. I added a bit of wiring here and there, and replaced a few parts with thin piano wire...otherwise, it's out of the box. And out of my steadily-reducing hair.

A challenging kit that will test you. You have been warned.











AK's Air Series of Acrylic Paints (or Adventures in Chemistry) <sup>by</sup> Dave Bottger



As an aircraft modeller and devotee of acrylic paints, I was pleased to learn that AK has released a series of what it calls 3rd generation acrylic paints for aircraft models. There are 120 colors available individually and in 47 sets of 3-8 bottles organized by period and country. Luftwaffe modelers are the best served with nine sets ranging from Legion Condor to late war and

including a set for seaplanes and one with cockpit colors. In all, there are three World War I sets, three interwar, 27 World War II and ten postwar sets. I was especially pleased to see sets of German World War I colors, doped linen colors and Finnish colors. Unfortunately, there are no sets of French World War I colors (admittedly a minefield) or Italian World War II colors, at least not yet. Since I have a Bf 109E waiting to be built, I bought the WWII Luftwaffe Early War Colors set. It contains four bottles, RLM 02 Grau (1938), RLM 65 (1938), RLM 70 and RLM 71. The set retails for \$17.95 and each bottle contains 17 ml., making the price \$.26 per ml. By comparison, Tamiya 10 ml. jars retail for \$2.50 or \$.25 per ml. I also bought a bottle of AK's thinner, although according to the website, these paints don't need to be thinned unless you want to airbrush fine lines.

Taking AK at its word, I first tried to spray these colors straight from the bottle. After spraying some isopropyl alcohol through my airbrush to clean it out (I had just used it to paint a model I was working on), I decided to start with the lightest color, RLM 02, which, for you non-Luftwaffe modelers, is a greenish gray. It looked too thick coming out of the bottle, but I proceeded nonetheless. I had decided to test these paints out first on bare plastic because I wanted to see how much adhesion they had.

I was surprised that the paint spattered terribly. Thinking that maybe it was too thick, I thinned it 20% with AK's thinner and tried again. Same result. Perplexed but undaunted, I rinsed both paint cups I had used with water (there's a reason for this detail), and tried again with a 60:40 ratio of paint to thinner and it sprayed fine.

Thinking that, contrary to AK's instructions, these paints needed to be thinned, I proceeded to try the RLM 65 (light blue) thinned 50% after again carefully cleaning my airbrush by spraying alcohol through it (another relevant detail). Again, spattering. Still too thick? I tried a 40:60 ratio of paint to thinner. Still spattered and beaded up on the plastic. Was there something wrong with the plastic?

I'll spare you the rest of the details and simply say that I kept getting inconsistent results regardless of the thinning ratios I used – sometimes the paint spattered and beaded, sometimes it laid down fine.

Finally the eureka moment. I wondered if the isopropyl alcohol I used to clean the airbrush between colors was the culprit, so I put a drop in a cup with some paint. Lo and behold, the mixture became a sticky mess. That's what was clogging my airbrush. Lesson learned –


## DO NOT LET ANY ALCOHOL COME IN CONTACT WITH THIS PAINT!

Armed with this knowledge, I sprayed all four colors straight from their bottles and they laid down very well. However, it was critically important that I cleaned my airbrush thoroughly between colors, especially the cone around the needle.

I use an Iwata Eclipse and if I didn't get all of the paint out of that cone, the next color just wouldn't spray. Simply running thinner (in this instance, water) through the airbrush between colors didn't work. I had to disassemble the airbrush between colors and clean the relevant parts with cotton swabs or small brushes. AK makes its own airbrush cleaner which I hope will expedite this process, or perhaps the paint needs to be thinned after all.

To test the adhesion of these paints, I let my sample dry overnight and then stuck some Tamiya tape on it. Only a small spot of the RLM 70 (black green) lifted off. I then decided to see if adding some Future to the paint or priming the plastic first would eliminate even this small problem. Fortunately, this paint is compatible with Future. A mixture of 80% paint to 20% Future seemed about right. Naturally the Future thinned the paint a little and required that I back off a bit on the pressure. About 12 psi worked well. I also sprayed some unthinned AK paint on plastic primed with Tamiya light gray primer from the spray can. After letting the paint dry for several hours, I stuck Tamiya tape down on it and pulled it off. The tape did not remove a speck of paint from either surface.

Finally I decided to test AK's claim that this line of paints will not clog the airbrush by drying on the tip, as many acrylics do. To really test it, I used RLM 70, the darkest color in the set I bought and thus the one with the biggest pigment. I thinned it 50% with AK's thinner (20% wasn't enough) and set my air pressure at 8 psi. I've included a photo of my test paper. As you can see, I'm no expert in airbrushing although I did get better with practice. More to the point, the tip never clogged. Apparently AK mixed a little retarding agent into these paints, which means they will dry a little slower.

I also hand-brushed a little RLM 65 and '70 on bare plastic. Both went on beautifully, covered in one coat and left no brush marks. I suspect the retarding agent helped out here as well.

AK claims that this line of paint is "designed taking into account the scale reduction effect." As I understand it, the scale effect varies depending on the scale of the model – colors should be lightened more for smaller scales. AK does not specify what scale these paints are supposedly designed for. Nonetheless, to check on AK's claim, I pulled out two old bottles of Polly Scale paint, RLM 02 and RLM 70, and brushed some of each on top of the corresponding AK colors. I couldn't see any difference between the Polly Scale and AK versions of RLM 02.


The AK RLM '70 is definitely lighter than the Polly Scale version, however. I'm still unsure how AK took the scale reduction effect into account, as claimed.

I'm not an expert on German World War II colors so I will not opine on the accuracy of these paints. You can look at the photo and draw your own conclusion.

AK advertises these as third generation acrylic paints. I have no idea what it considers the first two generations. Regardless, it also makes third generation general, figure, civil, AFV and fantasy/wargaming lines On balance, I am favorably impressed by this line of paint. It's acrylic, so they are odorless and clean up easily. They hand brush and airbrush equally well and adhere reasonably well even without Future or primer (both of which I'll still use). There are a broad range of colors available. On the downside, although they can be airbrushed straight from the bottle, thorough clean up between colors is essential, at least for my airbrush.

I intend to use the set I bought on the Bf 109E I mentioned. If they perform as well as they did in this test, these will become my paints of choice.

The last time I visited LionHeart Hobby in Kyle, they had most if not all of the AK Air sets in stock and they can special order individual bottles in this series as well as the other AK 3rd generation acrylics. What's Mp wid You?



New and In View Aircraft by Ron McCracken

December turned out to be not as exciting as November, in terms of new offerings. The only new-tool stuff due out this month is an A6M2 kit in 1/48th from Eduard, an F-15E in 1/72nd from Revell, and an F-82 Twin Mustang in 1/48th from Modelsvit. However, there are some interesting re-pops that are due on the shelves.

#### 1/48th Scale:

Eduard is releasing a new-tool A6M2 Zero in a Dual Combo 'Tora Tora Tora' special edition. At around \$100 it isn't cheap, but reviews are very positive and it includes color photo-etch, canopy masks, and of course two complete kits.



Eduard is re-releasing their Bf 109E-7 in a Weekend edition with four markings options.



Eduard is re-releasing their MiG-21PF in a Profipack edition. The kit includes color photo-etch, painting masks, and a large selection of decals for aircraft of at least four nations.



Eduard is re-issuing their 2021 Sopwith F.1 Camel in a Profipack edition with new decals.



Hasegawa is re-releasing a combo-kit consisting of one A6M2 Model 21, one D3A Model 11, and one B5N2 Type 97 in Pearl Harbor attack markings. This collection was previously released in 2016.



Hasegawa is re-releasing their F-2A (license-built F-16), I'm including it as it hasn't been released for a few years now.



HobbyBoss is re-releasing their CH-47D Chinook with some updated parts and decals.



Modelsvit is releasing a new-tool F-82F/G Twin Mustang. The kit includes pre-cut painting masks and photo-etch parts, and four decal options.

Eduard is re-releasing their Panavia Tornado as a 'Desert Babes' Limited Edition kit, with photo-etch, resin, eight decal options and pre-cut painting masks.

Hasegawa is re-releasing their 2008 B-24J Liberator, unchanged from the last release so far as I can determine.

The second from Fujimi is the IJN Yukikaze.




Vee Hobby is releasing a new American fast battleship the USS Indiana BB-58 as she looked in 1944.


Pit Road is releasing their own IJN Akizuki as she looked in 1944.

That's all the wind in the sails this voyage. Grab a kit out of your stash and build it!




Hello tread heads! Lots to get to this month so let's start off with 1/72nd scale. First up is Hobby Boss with a 130mm Russian coastal defence gun.



Moving on to 1/16th scale we have Das Werk with a Panzer 3J.




