Brengun's 1/144th Kubelwagen

There seems to be a budding trend in the scale modeling world toward the 'one true scale' of 1/144th models and dioramas. Any number of manufactures have been, for years, been producing some wonderful, small scale armor and aircraft kits. One thing that may have been missing is the ability of the modeler to place their latest small scale creations into context. Diorama or vignette builders have been somewhat at a disadvantage with the lack of 1/144th scaled vehicles with which to enhance the presentation of their small scale projects.

We are at a disadvantage no longer.

Brengun, along with some other manufacturers, have been producing some lovely 1/144th scale for some few days now.

Brengun has extensive offerings from which to choose: US / German staff cars, US jeep, Russian BTR's, GAZ-69, and now a 1/144th scale German Kubelwagen.

By design these kits are simplicity itself with parts that are in light gray resin, photo-etched accessory bits and clear acetate for windscreens. This kit, along with the others available from Brengun, also include decals. Another nice feature of these 1/144th scale construction kits from Brengun is the inclusion of two complete models.






Assembly of the Kubelwagen is simple. The most difficult aspect of assembly is removing the parts from the casting sprues. After attaching the wheels/tires and the photo-etched windscreen frame, license plates, steering wheel and shovel the kit is assembled...all that's left to do is choose a paint scheme.

The assembly instructions include a facsimile of the parts and three simple steps to assemble the Kubelwagen. One thing that isn't mentioned on the instructions involves the clear acetate for the windscreens. Not a huge problem because the average modeler will figure it out without too much fuss. Another area of note are the decals. Don't get me wrong, the decals are nicely printed and go on well They are printed on a small sheet of backing paper and the decal carrier film covers the entire sheet. Just carefully cut around the decals to remove that excess film and the problem will be solved.





The 1/144th scale Kubelwagen from Brengun is a lovely kit that will enhance anyone's next diorama or vignette. There is more than enough detail provided in this kit that it will and does hold its own as a stand-alone model. Can a 1/144th scale Schwimmwagen be far behind...?

While I was there a customer bought a Renwal 1/32nd Atomic Cannon that he had been looking for for several years.









I bought a set of MiniArt 1/35th Kharkhov tankers while I was there.



And when I say How-To articles I mean just that. Each installment in this issue of The Modeling Magazine: Abandoned has a blow by blow account that illustrates each author's process in achieving their visions. This step-by step approach also highlights the proper use of the myriad of finishing products available in the market place. The reader is presented with a wealth of information with concrete examples of how best to use chipping fluids, filters, oil weathering, and modeling pigments, to name a few.





Those visions are often spurred on from a photograph or online image experienced by each individual author/modeler. The beginning of each project is thoughtfully included as part of the articles. That genesis for each project is most welcome. It is always nice to know where the idea for a diorama or modeling project began and the progress from idea to fruition.

All of these articles are beautifully illustrated with multiple images that document not only the construction of each model but the layers of weathering that go into achieving the desired effect for each project. Several of the articles involve dioramas and the author's provided all the detailed steps they undertook to create the proper setting for their 'abandoned' vehicle.



As you go through this edition of The Weathering Magazine, I'm sure you will find any number of tips and tricks to use on your next project, or rethink how you might display a modeling project. Case in point is the 'Derelict' article. This article outlines the use of an aircraft model as an electronic target on a gunnery range. Possibly a great way to rethink how to display a shelf queen that might otherwise might be missing a critical part(s).

This issue of The Weathering Magazine: Abandoned is an excellent read. The number (six) of articles highlight the plethora of finishing products available to the modern scale modeler which should be of immeasurable use for those that may be unfamiliar with them.



This magazine should also be useful to those that have already been experimenting with them in order to move your skill set to another level. While all of these step-by-step articles are built and written by superb modelers there is no reason why anyone (myself included) couldn't copy their techniques to achieve similar results. This issue of The Weathering Magazine contains modeling and finishing techniques that you will be referencing again and again.





El Presidente (lan Latham) finished up his 1/48th Malta Recon Hurricane. Great job lan!



He also went out of his way to support the scale modeling websites as they started in the late 90s, always good for supplying review samples of anything.

Modeling Madness and Hyperscale wouldn't exist without him, that's for sure.

Too bad the MBA morons who bought him out and then bought each other out never understood what Squadron was. Of course, firing or letting go those who did know didn't help a bit.

Sadly, the place has really been dead for going on 2 years now. You had to order something so they could order it for you too often.
But Jerry's grandchildren – Sprue Brothers, Kitlinx and the others, live on. Long live the hobby. You were hard to love Jerry, but we all did, for what you did.

Some thoughts on building a Lukgraph 1/32nd SBU-1 Corsair

Having done a resin airplane before, and learned quite a bit (amazing how that happens every time we build a new kit), I saw this lovely yellow-wing on the Web, and just had to have it. Three weeks after punching the "Buy Now" button, it arrived at my door. Here are my thoughts on the Lukgraph 1/32 scale SBU-1 Corsair.

A very high-quality kit. My second full-resin aircraft (following the HpH Helldiver). Mostly trouble-free molding, without pinholes or major casting flaws. A few little bits here and there needed filling, but nothing that a little Tamiya putty won `t take care of.

Very detailed cockpits, but the interior tube framing will take time to clean up, and great care to align properly. I have seen other builders on the web use metal tubing and solder one together, but that particular skill is not yet in my personal toolbox. I added some wiring, but not much else is needed. Photoetch is fairly extensive, and very good.



Fit overall is pretty darned decent, with the exception of the interior wing struts. I had trouble with those, and ended up scratchbuilding a couple of those – don't know if I messed up or what, but the front ones seemed short to me. No biggie, just more time.

The provided peel-and-stick canopy frames were useless. I masked and painted mine, and that was just fine. Lukgraph gives you TWO vacuformed canopies, so that you can have a second chance at cutting yours apart correctly. I was lucky on the first try. The canopies are designed to fit in an open position, and sit nicely with a little judicious trimming.

Instruction illustrations were not terribly clear. Arrows sort of point to a general area and then you are on your own in places. Some guesswork, and reference time will certainly be in order, especially in the cockpit. Take your time, and do not proceed until you are clear on what goes where.

The kit responded well to cyano, Tamiya putty, Tamiya lacquer, and Testors enamels. Decals were thin, and laid down nicely with a little Micro Sol. The canopies were dipped in Future (or whatever it's called now), tacked in place with cyano, and then permanently sealed down with Elmer's. Fit was very good, especially at the front windscreen. Don't forget to drill the small hole for the telescopic sight.





Wing brace wires were replicated with fine piano wire — tying wires is too crazy. This way, they never sag, nor do they fray. Wire looks like...wire.

This kit absolutely requires a building jig — I used the AJO1 from Hobby Zone USA, and it worked quite well to align all wings. The jig also provided me with an afternoon`s entertainment putting it together. Highly recommended, for ANY biplane kit, indeed, any aircraft at all.













Overall, the kit was excellent, and if you are a fan of yellow-wing Navy aircraft, this should be on your list. Taking your time and making damned sure about things before you glue them is the key here. But the results were way more than worth it. I am seriously pondering the Boeing F3B kit now......

Old Rumors and New Kits

Trumpeter has announced a re-release of their F-100C Super Sabre with new decals and updated parts. This is based on their 2007 kit.




ICM is releasing a 1/32nd Italian Fiat CR. 42 Falco along with a figure set to go with it.





1/48th Scale

Hong Kong Models has announced a B-17F Flying Fortress in Memphis Belle markings. This is a re-release of last year's B-17G kit with some new parts to back-date it to a B-17F. So, I suppose you could technically say this one is new, but only just barely.





Roden has announced a re-release of their 2019 new-tool Arado Ar 68F-1 with some updated/new parts.



1/72nd Scale

Hasegawa is releasing a "limited edition" F/A-18E Super Hornet in VF-151 CAG markings. The kit appears to be a re-boxing with new decals and possibly some updated parts.



Hasegawa is also re-releasing their F-35A
Lightning II 'Beast Mode' kit, which means it
has external stores and pylons under the wings.
Markings for JASDF are the only new feature compared to earlier releases.



Hasegawa is also re-releasing their Fuji T-1A/B trainer in a limited edition with an included Tow Tractor

Atlantis is releasing the old 1950's Revell box scale B-29.(Editor's note:The image below is not the kit nor the markings of the kit.)




1/35th scale







Dragon has a few for us this month. First is a German Armored truck with a Flak 38 mounted on the back. Dragon has released this combo previously as an un-armored version.




Up next from Dragon is a welcome Japanese Type 97 Chi-Ha.



MiniArt has two this month one German and the other US. The US release is an M3 Lee with interior.






First up, another small set of figures in 1/72nd from Zvezda. The latest addition to their inhouse war gaming system "The Art of Tactic" is a set of Soviet assault troops. These figures usually come with a small base, for movement purposes in the game, but this group is unique in that they come with a small building allowing you to make a vignette with them right out of the box. The nice thing about these figures, is that unlike a lot of 1/72nd scale plastic figures, they're made of hard plastic and can be sanded and primed easily.


With what has to be the final set in a series of German tankmen, Miniart has released their 5-ton gantry crane set, and included a couple German tankmen figures and a Maybach engine. The crane set was nice, but the addition of the two crewman is a real bonus and makes adding them to a small scene even easier, and with Miniart's previous releases, you can have the crew doing everything from changing an engine, to painting new camouflage, to repairing wheels and tracks.

Royal Model Miniatures has a nice selection of 1/35th scale U.S. tanker heads. These are especially nice, since you can usually find a bunch of plastic tank figures, but normally they're not that great, especially if they came with the model. Since the majority of the figure's body will be inside the tank, you can put a very nice resin head on a not-so-nice plastic body, and nobody will be the wiser.



Also, from Royal Models is the "tank man" from the Tiananmen Square protests in 1989. This resin figure comes in 1/35th or 1/72nd scale, and will go well with all those old Type 59 Chinese tank models you have laying around, or you could use a T-55 model and nobody will notice the difference.


















To all fellow modelers,

Check with your contest chairmen or the event page on the IPMS/USA website before you get in your car!


Dust off your stash and build some models. As the country music artist Gary Allan sings, "Every storm runs out of rain".


