RON MCCRACKEN BUILDS AND REVIEWS REVELL'S 1/48 F-15E



At our October show I stopped by Lion-Heart's table and was introduced to Revell's recent McDonnell-Douglas F-15E Strike Eagle kit. Rudy was kind enough to open the box and allow me to verify that the kit has full intake ducts for the engines. As it is the only 1/72nd kit of the F-15 I'm aware of that has this feature, that was enough to close the deal.

Closer examination of the substantial amount of plastic in the box revealed several things. First, Revell has done a decent job of replicating the complex afterburner nozzles without resorting to resin-the only kit I know of to get this detail correct. Panel lines are recessed, and just deep enough to allow effective use of a panel line wash.

A full load of external stores is provided, but I found them disappointing. The kit supplies six Mk 82 bombs, four GBU-12 laser-guided bombs, and four AIM-9L Sidewinders. The sprues also include four AIM-7 Sparrows, but the Sparrows aren't used if building per the instructions. Every one of these items requires some assembly, and the fins are pretty thick. I replaced the Mk 82s with aftermarket parts because the kit parts come with shipping covers instead of fuses on the noses of the bombs. Finally, "conformal" fuel tanks (CFTs) on the fuselage sides are the only build option. For the "E" this isn't really a problem – they are usually installed on the E variant. They are less universally used on the C variant, but can be. But it makes a future "A" or "B" model kit improbable, as these variants were not equipped to use the CFTs.

Parts fit is generally very good, although I did find a touch of filler necessary on some of the major component joint lines – especially the seams between the CFTs and the lower wing panels.

The other disappointing feature was the treatment of the wing trailing edge. They could have engineered the kit to present a proper knife-edge, but instead opted for a joint at the trailing edge of the flaps, with the result that the trailing edges are fully 3/64th of an inch thick. Then, they actually cast the aileron trailing edge (which is completely incorporated in the upper wing half and could have been cast with a thin trailing edge) thick enough to match the flaps! So, you will need to uses files/sandpaper to make this feature more realistic.

This is a complex kit, and my advice to the builder is to pay close attention to the instructions and follow their assembly sequence (with a couple of exceptions noted below).). For example, the lower wing panels are fastened to the intake duct parts BEFORE assembly to the upper fuselage/wing panels – if you get in a hurry and glue the wing panels

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together first, you create an assembly problem for yourself later. Also, there are a number of flashed-over holes you need to finish drilling out prior to assembly.



Now for some specifics:

must be filled in or filed out.

2.Be careful assembling front/rear cockpit parts – You need to trim a slight amount of flash from the rear cockpit part where it joins the front, or they don't fit all the way together – and that will cause you problems down the road. 3. The cockpit tubs have raised ledges upon which the ejection seats rest. The Rear cockpit seat mounts need trimmed almost completely away or the canopy won't fit in the closed position because the seat sits too high. Provisions are made to display the canopy open, and that's the option I'd recommend, as the canopy fit to the fuselage top isn't the best. But if you want to preserve the option to build it closed you need to do some trimming and test fitting before cementing the completed cockpit inside the forward fuselage halves.

4.Each ejection seat comes in four parts, a left and right half, ejection rails, and the seat cushions. Make sure the seat halves are snugly fitted together, or the seats will be too wide to fit between the cockpit sides. They are a snug fit even when done carefully.



Even an extra-thick layer of paint will cause fit problems, so airbrush your cockpit tubs and the seats.

5.For some reason the instructions don't specify a color to paint the glare shields covering the cockpit instrument panels. Black, or a very dark gray, would be appropriate.

6.Delay attaching the air data probes (parts 1. Intake ducts have some ejector pin marks that $|_{D_{33}}$ to the sides of the nose until after you've finished painting and decaling. You'll have a difficult time applying the checkerboard nose trim otherwise.

> 7.I'd suggest filing your wing trailing edge down to a knife edge immediately after step 12 in the instructions, if you haven't done it already. It gets harder to access after that.

> 8.In steps 18 and 19 be sure to attach parts A-65 BEFORE attaching parts E-76 and E-77. Attaching the Conformal Fuel Tanks is a bit of a pain requiring gentle pressure to force them into place, but once in place they fit remarkably well. I needed a wee dab of filler at the extreme front and rear, otherwise the final fit to the fuselage was pretty seamless. Because of the forcing, I recommend use of cement for plastics rather than CA, to avoid cracking the parts. I suggest starting at the aft end and working your way forward, gluing as you go. 9. The instructions, in step 21, call for assembling the intakes to the fuselage before attaching the finished cockpit section in step 22.

In this case I'd recommend reversing the sequence, as the seam between the cockpit and the fuselage needs a touch of filler and you can't get at all of it if the intakes are already in place.

10.Step 23 is the installation of the nose radome. Be sure to add sufficient nose weight before cementing the radome in place. Fortunately, there is enough room in the radome to hold as much as you'll need.

11.Revell evidently used slide mold technology to get the canopy shape correct. Unfortunately, it left a thin mold line right down the center of the canopy, so you'll have to sand that off and repolish the canopy parts – or, just ignore it and hope no one notices.

12.Step 37 details what to do if using the option for an open canopy. I recommend leaving this step for last, otherwise you'll almost certainly break the canopy off during the rest of the assembly, painting, decals, etc.

13.I suggest installing the engine afterburners after the rest of the aircraft is painted. It'll save a painful masking job. However, do some test fitting of parts D18 into the fuselage openings, as they are an extremely tight fit and if you don't take steps to enlarge the openings you'll have trouble installing the finished afterburners without dislodging parts. I discovered one odd thing about the kit afterburners. there should be 15 actuator rods, one for each segment of the variable nozzle. Photos of actual F-15s confirm the one-for-one ratio. The kit afterburner parts have 15 actuator mounting points. But for some reason only 10 parts for each are provided. This is actually easy to fix. Get some .020" X .020" strip plastic and cut 30 pieces of it using the kit parts (D17) as a guide to length.



Since the kit parts are nothing more than .020" square strips anyway, you avoid the effort of cutting them free of the sprue and cleaning them up and you end up with the right number of parts with much less effort!

14. There are six individual bomb racks that mount to the sides of the CFTs. These are molded in two parts, and the instruction's steps 42 through 47 cover the assembly of each bomb rack. On steps 59 and 60, where you assemble the completed racks to the sides of the CFTs, they got the sequence reversed. Steps 42 and 45 should go to the front, not rear, of the tanks. I figured this out because the alignment tabs on the bomb racks didn't line up if I followed the instructions, but if I reversed the sequence all went together nicely.

15.The last thing to go on the underside of the model are the drop tanks/pylons with their Sidewinder missiles. The only attachment provisions are two tiny pins, which are entirely too flimsy, given the weight of the pylon/tank/ missile assembly. Cut off the pins on the tops of the pylons, drill holes in their place using a #63 drill (.037") and replace them with longer pins made from 18 gauge wire.

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The decals provided are D-Day memorial markings used by the 48th Fighter Wing at RAF Lakenheath. These markings make for a more-than-usually colorful F-15. On the plus side, the decals are just thick enough to be easy to work with, and they respond well to Solvaset to get them to snuggle down into place. Also, Revell thoughtfully provided extras for the numerous "no step" and other small markings scattered over the model, so there's no need to panic if one goes astray.

Decals are provided for the bomb and missile markings, and in the case of the Sidewinders, two sets of decals are provided, but with no explanation of which to use. So, the markings with the blue stripes are for inert training missiles, the ones with red and yellow stripes are for live missiles.

On the other hand, the editors for the decal section of the instruction sheet messed up in several places on the top view. For example, the part number callouts at the inboard

trailing edge of the starboard wing are wrong. They should be the same as those on the port side.

Also, the "D-day" stripes that wrap around the underside of the fuselage are designed to be applied before the weapons rails are added to the CFTs. Then, after assembling the rails and bomb racks to the aircraft, an additional dozen black and white bits and pieces have to be added to finish the decaling job. The only place this is mentioned is a note on the upper right corner of page 19, so I had my model assembled before I even saw this. My suggestion is to mask and paint those black-and-white stripes once the model is assembled and painted the basic overall gray color.

In my opinion it is actually a lot less work that way. The decal stripes for the wings can be used, but be sure to apply the decals before attaching the drop tanks.

Finally, the decals for the wing stripes on my kit didn't completely meet at the leading edge, necessitating a touch-up with black and white paint.

In summary, Revell has engineered an excellent kit of the F-15E. It calls for patience in assembly, certain allowances for errors in the instructions, and a bit of enhancement of the attachment points for the underwing stores, but once completed the reward is an accurate representation of an historically important combat aircraft.





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
Brengun's 1/144 **SA-9 GASKIN:** A build and review by Ben Morton.



Hot on the heels of Brengun's 1/144th scale BDRM-2 scout car (item # 144061) comes the anti-aircraft version of the base vehicle. With the addition of some optional parts the vehicle is equipped with the launcher for the Strela-1 missiles and additional ready rounds that mount the outside of the vehicle. Following on the previous release (the basic BRDM-2) Brengun also includes some photo etch for rear details (propulsion cover and rear stowage lockers), rear tail lights, headlamp protectors for the front and a chassis mounted rear view mirror.



Putting this all together begins by removing the resin pouring stubs from the appropriate components. The tires are cast as single parts and benefit from drilling out the mounting dimples to achieve a better fit on the axle stubs integral to the main chassis. All of the resin bits cleaned up without any bother. There is nice detail on the all the resin parts particularly on the rear deck, launcher, and the tread pattern on the tires.



After assembly the entire model was primed and painted with Tamiya Nato green . The instructions would have you paint the vehicle in Khaki. I dry brushed the entire thing with Cockpit Green to bring out all the details. This was followed by a wash of black panel liner and the deed was done.

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Brengun does provide decals should you so choose to mark your Gaskin in either Russian , Czech or Polish markings. Number sets o thru 9 are included and it should be noted that all the decals are printed on a single piece of decal film so be sure to cut them apart before dunking them in H2O.





This 1/144th scale SA-9 Gaskin makes up into a neat vehicle for your next table top war game or as a stand alone model. Combined with some of the other 1/144th scale offerings from Brngun a more than satisfactory diorama could also be in the offing.



Last month was our first meeting in our new venue. Dragon's Lair Comics and Fantasy is ASMS's new home. Thank you Dragon's Lair for hosting us!


If you're not familiar with Dragon's Lair they are Austin's premier source of comics and gaming supplies. They're also host to game players to gather and compete with each other.





Milton Bell shared a couple of projects, a 1/48 Tamiya Sdkfz 232 and an in progress 1/72nd Arma P-39.






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
Matt brought in a Millenium Falcon and a 1/72nd Razor crest, both fine peices of work.

Eduard has also re-released their Fokker D.VII (OAW) in a Profipack edition.




Eduard is releasing a Mi-24V/Mi-35 Hind E in a Limited Edition, which usually means some extra goodies or an unusual decal selection.

Another IJN release from Pit Road is the destroyer Nenohi.




Next from Pit Road is the IJN light cruiser Yubari.



Last from Pit Road in 1/700 is the JMSDF Aegis class destroyer Ashigara.




AFV is releasing the guided missile cruiser Oliver Hazard Perry


